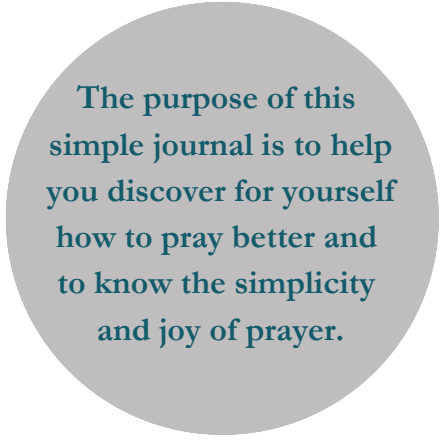
It's not difficult to understand why our enemy would want to confuse us about prayer. If we don't pray effectively, we don't live effectively. So, if we see prayer as something beyond us or confusing or mysterious, we won't pray correctly or significantly. The truth is, we need to learn how to pray.

Therefore, the purpose of this simple journal is to help you discover for yourself how to pray better, to know the power and joy of prayer. I am sharing with you some things that have been helpful to me in my journey as one who is learning to pray.

This is not a book on prayer. Certainly you can find wonderful books written by people much more qualified than I am. I would not presume to write such a book, because I am not an expert on prayer. But I think that for the very reason I do struggle to find practical ways to make prayer an effective and meaningful daily time with God and because I'm not a "natural" at it, I am able to share these suggestions with you who also need some practical help.

This is a journal; it is intended to give you a basis and structure from which you develop your own prayer journal. The guidelines and methods for prayer given here are things that have helped me, but they are not sacred.

I encourage you to use the parts of this journal which you find helpful. Innovate and adapt it to your own methods of prayer which you find effective.



The purpose of this simple journal is to help you discover for yourself how to pray better and to know the simplicity and joy of prayer.

No two of us pray alike. Every relationship is unique and that certainly is true in our relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Therefore, we'll each have our own unique ways of communicating with our Lord, and that's the way it should be.

If this journal is of any help to you in your desire to learn how to pray, I will be very thankful.

Why A Prayer Journal?



When something is important to our lives, we plan and prepare and give it a lot of attention. In our business lives, we wouldn't dare "wing it" with an important sales presentation, where a big order was at stake. Yet, many Christians approach prayer very carelessly and undisciplined and then wonder why their prayers seem lifeless and humdrum.

In Luke 11 one of the disciples asked Jesus, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples." If prayer was something so essential and important that Jesus prayed a lot and John taught his disciples to pray, they reasoned, and rightly so, that it would be important for them to pray and pray well. Hence their request "Lord, teach us to pray."

Notice that Jesus didn't respond by saying, "Oh, prayer is a personal thing. It can be done in any way as long as you are sincere." No, he said, "Here's the way to pray," and he gave them a format for prayer which we have called The Lord's Prayer.

In other words, by his response he said, "Learning to pray is a very worthwhile thing; you need to learn. And I will teach you."

I believe we need to be constantly in the school of prayer, learning to pray more effectively and with more power. That's the reason for this prayer journal—to give you a practical way to enroll in "Prayer 101" and help you pursue the study of prayer.

Actually, it's presumptuous of me to even suggest I could teach anyone how to pray, since I haven't graduated or received my degree as yet! Let me make it clear from the beginning that the Holy Spirit is the teacher in "Prayer 101," and he alone can teach us how to pray.

But what I hope to do is, first, make you aware that you need to learn how to pray. It is something to be studied and practiced, and we improve our ability to pray the more we determine to learn to pray better. Then I want to give you a basic structure that has been helpful to me. I find that many Christians stumble in their attempts to pray for lack of any structure or procedure.

I believe the use of a prayer journal will help you in many ways, including these:

1. It will structure your praise and prayer time so that you won't forget the many prayer needs and praise items.
2. It will give you a record of answered prayer.
3. It will help you pray, especially on those days when you don't want to pray or the feelings are missing.
4. It will help you pray with purpose and eliminate "shallow praying."
5. It will generate new enthusiasm and excitement for prayer on your part.

Our Biblical Format



Since Jesus is the master teacher, his prayer instructions are the most important ones. The model he gave us for prayer is the best. You'll find it in Matthew 6 and Luke 11.

Briefly, The Lord's Prayer teaches us that prayer should contain:

Praise and Adoration

"Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name,

Commitment

"your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Petition

"Give us today our daily bread.

Repentance and Forgiveness

"Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one." —Matthew 6:9-13

A Time and Place for Prayer



While prayer is not a legal requirement and should not be approached in some legalistic, follow-the rules, do-it-by-the-book manner, it does nonetheless require discipline. We have to be disciplined to accomplish anything important, and I urge you to set a certain time aside every day for prayer and meditation.

I strongly recommend morning time, because you have more control over your early morning hours and your mind is more alert. If you don't set aside a time in your schedule that is reserved for prayer and you don't discipline yourself to stick to it no matter what, you will not be likely to ever discover the real power and privilege of prayer.

I also encourage you to determine a consistent place for prayer in your home. I find it very conducive to my prayer life to have a certain place where my Bible and devotional books are close by. It has become my "prayer chair" and it helps me focus my mind on God more quickly.

This prayer journal will not teach you to pray. It is simply a tool to use. Prayer is like swimming—you'll never learn until you get in the water! You learn to pray by praying. This journal will hopefully help you "get in the water" and enter the school of prayer.

How to Use Your Prayer Journal



This is your prayer journal and you can use it in any way that best suits you. In fact, you may eventually abandon this actual journal and start one in another book, structured to suit your style of praying more. That's fine, because this journal is intended to be a guide and to get you started in "Prayer 101."

The journal is divided into four sections, following the pattern of The Lord's Prayer:

Section 1: Praise and Thanksgiving

The first part of my prayer time is directed toward getting my mind off of me and onto God, so I usually begin with a time of praise and adoration. As I've read scripture, I've listed the attributes of the Triune God for which I am thankful and for which he is worthy of praise. I have divided this section into the three persons of the Godhead: God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and I go through this list in my praise of God.

In this journal I have listed a few of these attributes, but I've left room for you to discover more for yourself and write down your own reasons to praise God. Mine has been in process for over twenty years, so it has grown. It will be much more meaningful to you as you discover and make your own list of what to praise God for.

In addition, in this section I have a list to remind me of all that I personally have to be thankful for. You can list in that section God's blessings in your life.

Section 2: Confession and Dedication

Usually after praise, I confess any known, specific areas of sin, and also ask God to show me hidden sins of which I'm not aware. Then, I commit my life to him for the day ahead and dedicate anew my time and resources to his service.

As scripture speaks to me and convicts me of areas in my life which need improvement, I have noted those things in my prayer journal, and I frequently go through the list (now numbering over 60) and ask God to change me and make me more and more like Jesus in these specific areas.

Section 3: Intercession

I used to be frustrated because I tried to pray for a lot of people and organizations every day. Then I realized that isn't necessary—nor is it possible—so I have assigned them to different days of the week.

For example, Mondays I pray for my family, Tuesdays for close friends, Wednesdays for staff, board members, and other close friends, Thursdays for the needs of our ministry and its listeners, Fridays for other ministries and organizations, and Saturdays for world needs. In this way, I can get around to everyone I want to intercede for on a regular basis. These are all written down in my prayer journal to help me remember.

Of course, I can be totally flexible in this routine and pray for anyone and anything at any time. So, the structure for intercessory prayer is not “set in concrete,” but simply helps organize my intercession and allows me to pray for others with more depth and less haste.

This is one section where you will want to customize it to suit your life and the people for whom you intercede. But intercession should be a major part of your prayer time. Not only is it important for the welfare of others, but it helps you get your focus off of yourself when you pray for other people. Your problems seem much smaller after intercessory prayer.

Section 4: Personal Requests and Answers

In this section I bring to God all the needs I have personally, the needs of my ministry, etc. And I have a list of specific requests I've brought to God, with a notation when and how he answered. This list goes back several years now, and what a blessing and encouragement it is to me to review all the answers to prayer over the years.



Pray Scripture



I want to encourage you to pray scripture into your life. More and more I'm praying scripture, because then I know I'm praying in the right way for the right things. I pray scripture in several ways:

1. I use praise passages, which have been written down in my journal to offer praise and thanksgiving. It's hard to improve on the way those saints of old praised God, and so I often use their words.

2. As God speaks to me through his Word, I write down those verses in my journal to address any area of need in my life. And then I pray them often. These are in the *Confession and Dedication Section* and you'll find some examples on pages 44 and 45.

3. The third way I pray scripture is to use the prayers of the great people in the Bible to pray for others and for myself. Have you ever felt like you didn't know how to pray for other people? Maybe you end up with lots of "Lord, bless so and so" prayers. Well, for your friends and relatives who are believers, the best thing you can do for them is pray some of the Apostle Paul's prayers.

4. I "pray back" the scripture I read for the day. For example, if your Bible reading takes you to Proverbs 11, you can "pray back" much of that chapter. Verse two says, "When pride comes, then comes disgrace, but with humility comes wisdom." Pray it back by saying, "Lord, reveal any pride in my heart. I don't want to bring disgrace to your name. Teach me how to be truly humble; grant me the wisdom that comes through humility."

Or, if you are reading Psalm 94, you can "pray back" verse 18 which says, "When I said, 'My foot is slipping,' your love, O Lord, supported me. When anxiety was great within me, your consolation brought joy to my soul." That leads to a wonderful prayer of praise: "Oh God, my feet have slipped so often but you have always been there with your steadfast love. (You could recite a specific incidence of this nature.) Lord, I have often been anxious and worried about various situations, but you have consoled me and brought joy to my soul. Thank you, Lord."

It is a great blessing to "pray back" the scriptures as you read them.

Throughout this journal you will see scripture included which you can pray into your life and pray for others. But I urge you to keep adding scripture in your journal that you use for your prayer time. You're going to be amazed how often you read something in the Bible that you know needs to be prayed, and that's when you stop and write it in your journal.

I have also included some hymns, songs, poems, and quotations that have been meaningful to me in my prayer life. I'm sure you'll have many others with special meaning for you that you'll want to add.

As you pray and as God speaks to you through his Word, write down in your prayer journal those things of significance—so that you won't forget and you'll continue to pray those things into your life.

Conviction by the Holy Spirit

1. Definite and specific. The Lord tells me exactly what I have done.
2. Recognizable. It is something unconfessed and unforgiven that I recognize—usually in the immediate past.
3. Definite solution. The Holy Spirit tells me how to take care of the sin. When I obey, I get relief from soul-pain guilt.

Condemnation by the enemy

1. Indefinite and vague. I feel guilty but cannot identify any specific sin.
2. Imaginary. I have a hard time putting my finger on this—unless it is in the past that I have already taken care of.
3. Usually no solution. If any solution is offered, it is irrational and unscriptural. The soul-pain intensifies.

As you read scripture, list verses or passages which speak to you about areas in your life that need to be improved or changed. Pray that scripture into your life. Here are two examples based on scripture:

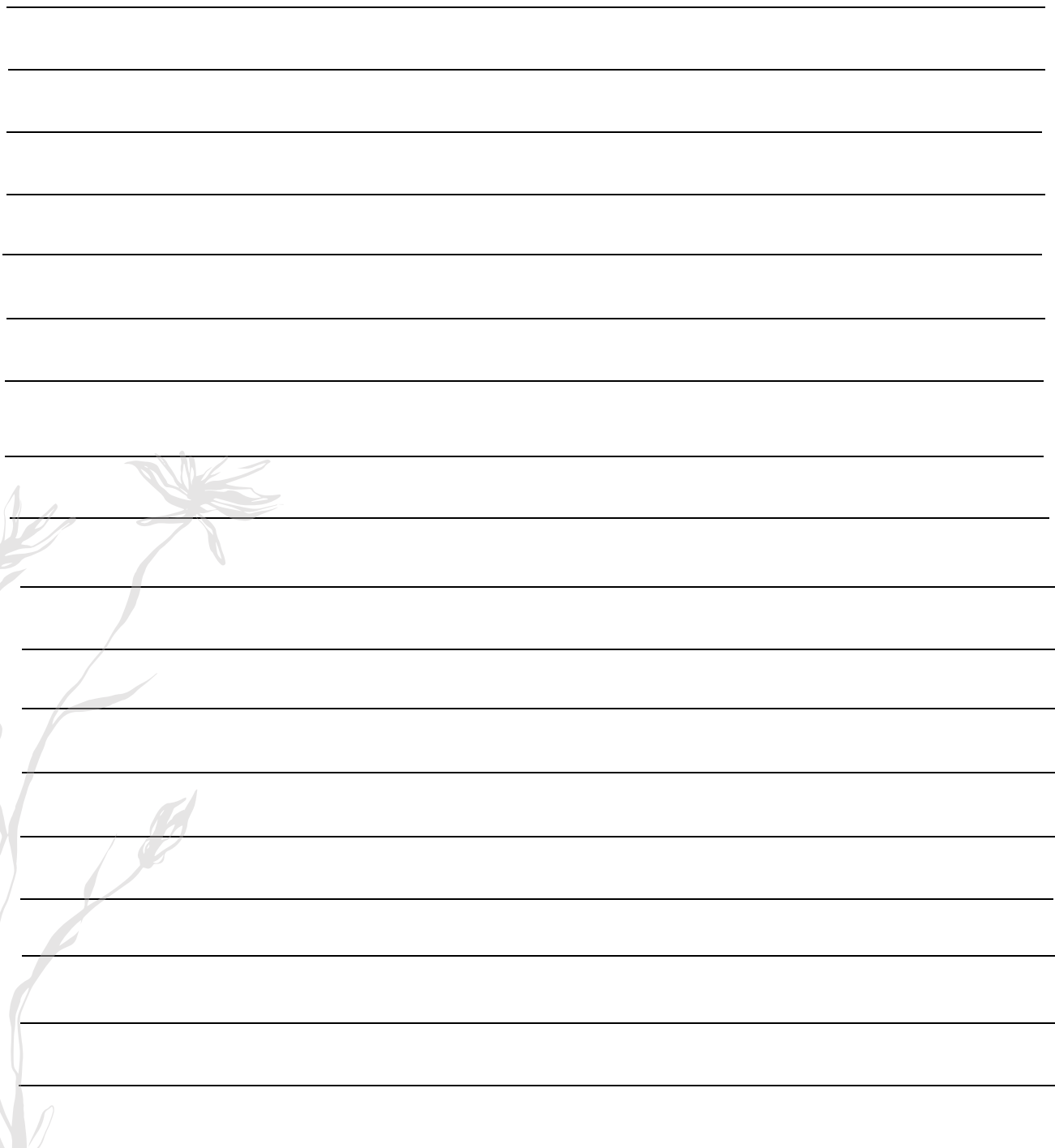
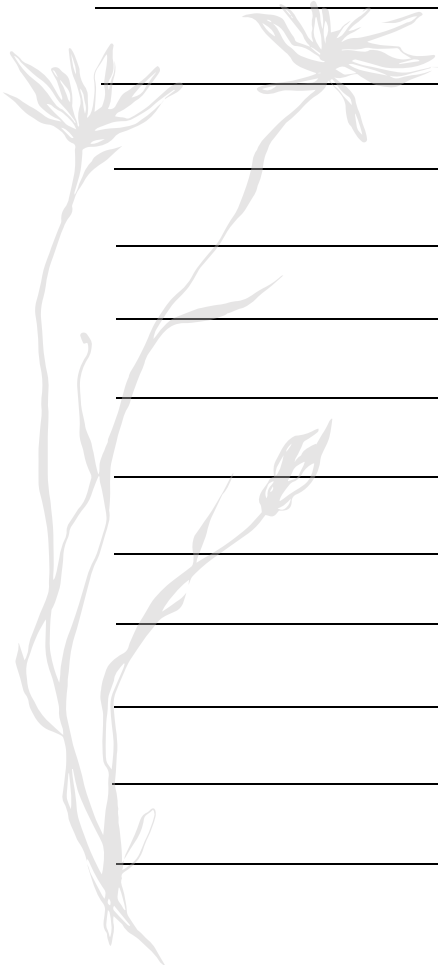

A personalized prayer

Lord, today I put on the helmet of salvation; please protect my mind from wrong thoughts.

I put on the breastplate of righteousness; please protect me from the onslaughts of my enemy who will try to discourage and dishearten me.

I put on the belt of truth; please help me to be totally truthful with everyone I deal with today, and give me discernment to know truth from error.

I put on the shoes of the gospel of peace; help me to keep marching today in these peaceful shoes, no matter what happens.

I take the shield of faith; please strengthen my faith so that I am not vulnerable to any of the fiery darts of my enemy.

And I take the sword of the Spirit, the Word of God; please bring to my mind scripture verses that will defeat my enemy and bring me victory.

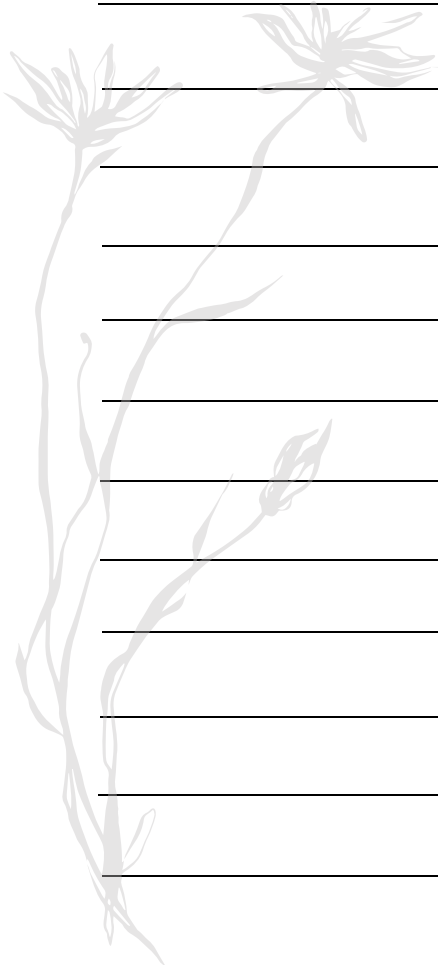
You'll find others passages as you read God's Word and the Holy Spirit brings certain scripture to your attention. Include them in this section.

W

hen Jesus prayed for his disciples, as recorded in John 17, he prayed for these specific things:

1. That they would be protected by the power of God's name (vs. 11).
2. That their joy would be full (vs. 13).
3. That they would be protected from the evil one (vs. 15).
4. That they would be sanctified by the truth of the Word (vs. 17).
5. That they would be brought to unity as a witness to the world (vs.23).

Use this as a guide to praying for other believers.

There are many individuals and groups that we need to intercede for regularly. You may want to set aside certain days for certain people and groups, so that you can intercede for everyone on your list at least weekly. Remember to include family members, close friends, friends and acquaintances who are not yet believers, coworkers and managers, employers, churches and ministries you support, the government and those in authority, and world needs.
